

54TH ANNUAL CONVENTION MEDAL

Our 54th convention medal design was chosen by the Convention Committee from a design submitted by ONA member Thomas P. Sanders. The medal features the Victoria Park Clock Tower. For nearly 50 years the tower was the focal point of the beloved Renaissance revival style city hall which was demolished, amid great controversy, in 1973 (Kitchener, Ontario). Thankfully there were enough foresighted individuals to have the clock tower carefully dismantled and preserved for future generations. As one of Kitchener's most recognizable landmarks, it now stands watch at the entrance to Victoria Park (off Joseph and Gaukel streets).

Mr. Sanders' rendition depicted below marks the first time the tower has become a focal point of a Waterloo Coin Society / Ontario Numismatic Association medal. Previously in 1972, banquet medals were struck for the WCS which featured the former Kitchener city hall built in 1924. A K-W Oktoberfest trade dollar was issued in 1996 to celebrate the reconstruction and formal dedication July 1, 1995 of the Heritage Clock Tower (as it was known then) in its permanent home ending many years of discussion and debate. Today the clock tower is prominently featured as the City of Kitchener's official logo.



Silver and Brass medals will be in short supply with limited mintage of only 40. Copper will also have a limited mintage of 100 this year.



CALL FOR NOMINATIONS FOR 2016 O.N.A. AWARD OF MERIT *and* FELLOW OF THE O.N.A.

The Ontario Numismatic Association bestows two distinct awards annually to recognize numismatists that have made contributions towards the advancement of numismatics, either throughout Ontario or at the local club level. These awards are the O.N.A. **"Award of Merit"** and the **"Fellow of the O.N.A."** The announcement of recipients occurs at the annual O.N.A. banquet. The awards are in the form of a silver medal, a suitably inscribed certificate, an engraved metallic name badge and a complimentary seat at the O.N.A. banquet.

The O.N.A. Awards Committee is now calling from individual members of the O.N.A. for nominations for the **"Award of Merit"** and the **"Fellow of the O.N.A."** Award. You are invited to submit the name of a resident of Ontario who is a member of the O.N.A. that you consider worthy of being recognized with the **"Award of Merit"** who has significantly contributed to the success of the O.N.A. and numismatics in the Province of Ontario. You may also nominate up to any three O.N.A. members as a **"Fellow of the O.N.A."** Nominations received from individuals for themselves will not be considered.

Please be sure to include a full summary of the nominees' numismatic achievements and contributions to ensure that the O.N.A. Awards Committee is fully apprised of your nominees' activities. The simple suggestion of a name does not represent a nomination.

Nominees should be well rounded in all phases of numismatics. The judging committee will review the following areas:

- local coin club work: involvement with special events; executive positions held at the local club level & length of service; contributions to overall club success; give specific example of each.
- local community work: organizing a numismatic displays in libraries, malls or other public locations; other examples relating to the promotion of numismatics.
- numismatic education: writing, research; published articles and/or books; exhibiting at coin shows, mall promotions or other events; list achievements.
- regional involvement: involvement with the hobby on a regional/national level; involvement with organizing coin conventions (list positions held); involvement with exhibiting and educational seminars at conventions.

- any other achievements or contributions to numismatics in Ontario, as well as listing achievements nationally and internationally.

The O.N.A. Awards Committee, charged with the responsibility of selecting recipients from the nominations, consists of four well-known numismatists who have previously received the Award of Merit and the President of the O.N.A. It is the responsibility of this Committee to select from the nominees the individual who should receive the "Award of Merit," and a maximum of three "Fellow of the O.N.A." recipients.

Since 2011, CAFNE has supported publications, numismatic courses held at colleges, symposiums at shows and both provincial and national conventions, RCNA Coin Kids events, and aided research initiatives.

NEW NUMISMATIC ONLINE MARKETPLACE

In the fall 2015, Trajan Media launched its new website www.coinstampclassifieds.ca (check out website FAQ or use the Contact button), where numismatists and philatelists can meet at one online marketplace to buy and sell numismatic collectibles. All listings (ads are active for 60 days) are FREE, with the ability to upload 12 images per listing. Potential buyers also have the opportunity to "make an offer" to sellers. Trajan makes its money by taking a commission (sales under \$100 = 10% or 50 cents minimum, \$100 but under \$1,000 = 8%, and over \$1,000 = 7%), but only when an item is sold as outlined in the buyer's agreement. Buy and Sell Coins, Notes and Stamps through the site's Introductory Sale offering "Commission-Free on all final sales until February 1st, 2016 at 9 a.m. EST." The listings are only available through this website. They are not published in the CCN or the CSN. If the Buyer is outside of Canada, then a Cross-border transaction fee of an additional 2% applies.

EDUCATION SYMPOSIUM CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Education symposiums are an excellent opportunity to help collectors get more out of the hobby. It's also a great way to engage beginner and experience collectors, which strengthens the hobby community overall. To quote Bret Evans (immediate Past President RCNA), "Knowledge is a very important part of numismatics. Not only is the historical and cultural background a significant part of the coin, note, or medal's story, but it also helps collectors make informed decisions about buying and selling."



ROBERT WILLIAM GEARY

Did You Know... that one of Ontario's earliest collectors was also an authority on the War of 1812? Robert W. Geary was born in Owen Sound, Ontario July 4, 1859 the only son of William Joseph and Emily Geary formerly of Cork, Ireland. Sometime in the early 1870's William and Emily took Robert and moved to Pinkerton, Ontario about 45 miles away in Bruce County. Here William set up shop as a cabinet maker.


On May 29, 1883 R.W. Geary married Jessie Pascoe of Niagara Falls, Ont. The marriage took place at All Saints Anglican Church in Niagara Falls Village. The bride and groom returned to Pinkerton where Geary would operate a dry goods store in a building newly built by his father William. His wife Jessie ran a millinery shop on the premises and was later joined by her mother-in-law in this endeavour. The population of Pinkerton was about 150. A short time later Geary formed Geary & Co. with 2 partners Thomas Pinkerton (saw and carding mills) and J.B. Campbell (harness maker). This union lasted until 1890 when Geary decided to go it alone and Campbell and Pinkerton open up in a yellow brick building directly across the road. The impression is that the split was not amiable or else was necessary and Bradstreet's directory made a point of reporting in their Dominion of Canada directory for Geary & Co. R.W. Geary only. I say that it may have been necessary because in the following year of 1891 Geary became the Postmaster and has a post office set up in back of his store. It is possible that the arrangement made by Geary to become postmaster could not include his partners for some reason. The year 1891 also saw the birth of his daughter Grace.



In 1898 Geary & Co. along with Jessie and Grace move to Niagara Falls and opened a dry goods store (also offering clothing and men's furnishings) at the intersection of Main Street and Lundy's Lane. Robert Geary would try his hand at retail sales for just a few more years before giving it up forever in 1907 to become a Real Estate agent. Geary operated out of his home first at 33 Barker St. and later at 92 Main St. He continued in this vocation for the next 20 years until about 1927. Jessie and Robert Geary celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary on May 29, 1933 just one month before Robert passed away on June 30, 1933. Robert William Geary was 74 years old when he died.

Shortly after Geary arrived in Niagara Falls he became involved with the Lundy's Lane Historical Society becoming the President in 1909 and remaining in this position for 24 years until his death in 1933. Geary became known in general as an specialist in the War of 1812 and an authority specifically on the Battle of Lundy's Lane. To say it was his passion clearly would be an understatement.

Geary wrote a 15 page pamphlet in 1912 as a 'Memorial of the 100th Anniversary of the War of 1812-14' which was published by the Lundy's Lane Historical Society. In 1914 Geary arranged and participated in a re-enactment of the Battle of Lundy's Lane. I am quite certain it was his idea as well to have medals made to commemorate this occasion and today we are reminded of this by the beautifully executed pieces in both bronze and sterling silver.



Along with his seemingly vast knowledge of the War of 1812 Geary was also something of an authority on Military buttons. In the 1905 Ontario Historical Society annual report Geary is quoted in connection to 'the potency of military buttons of British garrisons in Upper Canada as *synecdoche's to loyalist efforts' "All that visibly remains of these once gallant battalions are these old battered and corroded pieces of stamped metal - relics insignificant in themselves, yet immensely suggestive of the great struggles in the political formation of this continent".

At the time of his death Geary was the Honorary Vice-President of the Ontario Historical Society. Robert Geary was a frequent contributor to literary and historical publications in England, the United States and Canada.




In 1903 when W.R. McColl put out his list he made reference to R.W. Geary and his numismatic token on page 32 under the heading 'Numismatists or Coin Collectors'. McColl assigned the tokens number 811 for the brass and 812 for the aluminum. At 50c each McColl valued them at double most of the other like offerings possibly suggesting that there were not as many available. Given the familiar style of the obverse McColl may even have had a hand in the creation of these pieces.



McColl # 811 Brass




McColl # 812 Aluminum

Featured Wood of the Month reported by Ross Kingdon

Our November 7550-001 wood is 38mm blue / blue Chiefs wood issued to sponsor the Nokomis Chiefs hockey team. There was a second one 7550-002 black / black issued by *Nokomis and Community Credit Union* (formed in 1940, and now called *Affinity Credit Union* which provides District Council funding and sponsorship to local events in Nokomis) but Al Munro was unable to get that one. Quantities issued are unknown.



The Town of *Nokomis* (population 436) is located Northeast of the North end of the Last Mountain Lake (established in 1887 as the first bird sanctuary national wildlife area, and is regarded as a wetland of international importance) on Highways 15 and 20 in Saskatchewan. The first homesteads were established around 1904, and the community developed a few years later at the junction of two competing railways as they came through the area 1907-08. August 15, 1908, the community attained town status. The name *Nokomis* (Hiawatha's grandmother in Longfellow's epic poem) had been chosen in 1906 by Florence Mary Halstead for a post office she started Southeast of the present town site. By 1916 the town reached a population of 508 (it has hovered in the 430-510 range over the years) and had developed into a substantial service centre for the surrounding agricultural district. Now besides its famous golf courses and bird-watching sanctuary, *Nokomis* is known for being a hockey town (pond and arena)! Many NHL players come out of Saskatchewan and at least 3 have come from *Nokomis*.




Kids start out for fun playing pond hockey, then high school hockey, then university hockey or straight into juniors and onward towards their NHL dream. The *Long Lake Hockey League* houses the *Nokomis Chiefs*. The Chiefs start their season in November. Coming up they have a home game Nov. 17 against *Davison Cyclones* in the *Nokomis Recreation Centre*, then Nov. 18 away game against *Watrous Winderhawks* at the *Watrous Arena*, followed by home game Nov. 24 again *Lanigan Pirates*, and then away game Nov. 25 against *Drake Canucks* at the *Drake Sportsplex*. These are all regular season games, not exhibition. Team ties are broken by Best Win Percentage, Most Points, Fewest Games Played, Most Number of Wins, Highest Points For minus Points Against, and Lowest Points Against. The December schedule will be available on their league site shortly.

Elmer James Lach was born January 22, 1918 in Nokomis, and was inducted into the Hockey Hall of Fame in 1966 as a player, Position: Center, and he won three Stanley Cup championships (1944, 1946, 1953). Elmer played his entire 14-year National Hockey League career with the *Montreal Canadiens* (1940-1954); and was the center on the club's "Punch Line" with Toe Blake and Maurice Richard.



Nokomis is 130 kilometres North of Regina, and upon entering you will first see *Al Rahn's Service Centre & 2-Pump Gas Bar* (open 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. 7 days a week and operated by Rahn family since 1952) which provides you with your first opportunity to take in hockey memorabilia. There are newspaper clippings, signed hockey cards, posters and pictures of the town's sports heroes. The most prominent are Elmer Lach (nicknamed "Nokomis Flash" recording 215 goals and 408 assists during 664 games), and speedster Doug Horbul who enjoyed a lengthy minor-hockey career and played four NHL games with the *Kansas City Scouts*. Then there is the most recent addition, Jordan Hendry who signed a free-agent contract with the NHL's *Chicago Blackhawks*. These idols are honored at the Nokomis Recreation Centre too, as well as in the Nokomis Museum. Nokomis is a good place to live, a great place to raise a family.



Doug George Horbul was born July 27, 1952 in Nokomis and went on at age 22 to play Forward (Left-Winger) in the 1974-75 *Kansas City Scouts* NHL season. He was drafted by the *New York Rangers* in round 4 of the 1972 NHL Amateur Draft. Despite the brevity of his NHL career, Doug was a fine goal scorer in junior and the minors. Doug split his three-year junior career in the WCHL between the *Saskatoon Blades* and *Calgary Centennials*. He was chosen 63rd overall by the *New York Rangers* in 1972 after scoring 39 goals for *Calgary* in his last amateur season. He spent two years in the minors and scored 34 goals for the *Providence Reds* of the AHL in 1973-74. Doug spent two more seasons in the minors then competed for the senior *Trail Smoke Eaters* in 1977-78 before retiring.

Jordan Hendry born February 23, 1984 in Nokomis, became a Defence player who shoots left. He played 40 NHL games 2007-2011 (including 2009-2010 NHL playoffs) seasons with the *Chicago Blackhawks*, and the 2012-2013 with *Anaheim Ducks*. In 2002-2006 Jordan played on the *University of Alaska* (Fairbanks) team (CCHA), *Norfolk Admirals* / *Rockford Icehogs* / *Houston Aeros* (AHL) and 2011-2012 play for Swiss team *HC Lugano*.

ADVERTISING NOTES / FACSIMILE CURRENCY by Duff Malkin

Would you throw away something that might be real paper money?

Of course not, and that was the secret to the success of one of the most unusual advertising mediums ever invented, ads that look like real bank notes.

Before the Internet, before the Sunday paper, before radio, TV and billboard advertising, enterprising merchants developed a unique way to grab the attention of their customers. From the 1830's through the early 1900's, these merchants created and distributed advertisements printed on pieces of paper that were the same size and shape as currency circulating in America. These "ad notes," "look-alikes," or "advertising scrip" were widely distributed, mainly by hand. Some appeared as newspaper ads, some were dropped in the streets. People picked them up, and read them carefully, thinking that they just might be real bank notes. They were reluctant to throw them away,

The earliest advertising notes promoted patent medicines. Later, ad notes promoted shoes, furniture, clothing, baseball teams, books, pens, dentists, entertainers, and just about every other product or service under the sun.


The issuers circulated notes that employed prose, poetry, extravagant claims, and skillful exaggeration to sell their products.

The note featured here is a common front. The Bank of the United States, and can be found with multiple backs.

The American Vocational Association held its convention in Boston from December 6th to December 10th, 1969. A person accepting one of the real promissory notes The Vidmar company, of 11 Grammes Road, Allentown, PA. had booths number 524 and 525 at it.

In the 1940's a Swiss manufacturer A&R Weidmar introduced the first modular-drawer cabinet. In 1958 John Kleinoder, a Brooklyn-based tool and die maker, arranged to manufacture Weidmar cabinets in the United States under the name "Vidmar". In 1962 Vidmar cabinets became part of the first photocopiers made by the Haloid Corporation, which later became the Xerox Corporation. In 1962, Xerox asked Vidmar to open a plant in Allentown, PA. In 1966 Kleinoder sold the company to The Stanley Works of New Britain Connecticut, officially becoming Stanley Vidmar.

The logo seen on this advertising piece was filed for trademark registration at the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office on November 2nd, 1967 and registered on March 25th, 1969. It was first used in commerce on November 4th, 1958.




Facsimile of Bank of United States \$1,000 Note by Vidmar, a Stanley subsidiary advertising a new storage system on back.

Philadelphia, PA. The bank closed in 1841, after suspending payment in 1839.

This text explains something about the advertising text seen on this imitation 1,000 dollar promissory note or bond of the Bank of the United States dated December 15th, 1840. Real banknotes of this type are apparently only worth \$125.00. This 8894 serially numbered reproduction is a well known item.

The real item was issued six years after the Federal bank charter for the Bank of the United States (which was the second "Bank of the United States") lapsed (1834). At the time the bank was chartered in the state of Pennsylvania. The building seen on the note still exists and is located at 420 Chestnut Street in

EXHIBIT RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. In order to qualify as an O.N.A. competitive exhibitor, you must be a fully accepted current member of the O.N.A. and abide by the following rules and regulations.
2. Exhibits will be accepted only from persons that are members of the O.N.A. during the calendar year of the convention.
3. Exhibits will be divided into the following categories:
 - a. Canadian Coins & Tokens
 - b. Canadian Paper Money, scrip and related paper items
 - c. Non-Canadian Coins & Tokens
 - d. Non-Canadian Paper scrip and related paper items
 - e. Junior Exhibits by persons under 18 years of age
4. Topical exhibits will be allocated to the categories above depending on what the dominant subject matter is within the display.
5. Exhibits will be judged as per the Judges' Guideline Sheet.
6. All exhibits shall be grouped together according to category.
7. The Exhibits Chair can reject any exhibit at any time or determine the category it shall be entered and judged in.
8. The Exhibits Chair will keep a full and complete record of all exhibits showing the exhibitor's name, the exhibitors' number and the number of cases in each entry.
9. The names of competitive exhibitors will not be disclosed to anyone until the judges have completed judging and made their reports to the Head Judge, who will then be given the names of the exhibitors to whom the awards are to be made.
10. Small exhibit identification cards showing the exhibitor's number, number of cases and the category in which the exhibit is entered will be affixed to each case in the lower left corner of the exhibit.
11. Application for exhibit space and/or cases should reach the Exhibit Chair no later than two weeks prior to the start of the convention. All applicants will be given space and cases (if required) in order of receipt so long as they are available. No single exhibit may be entered in more than one category. However, any exhibitor may enter one exhibit in each of several categories. Each exhibitor must designate the group which she/he wishes to enter.
12. No material exhibited will be offered for sale, nor will advertising, in any form, be permitted with any exhibit. The name or identity of any competitive exhibitor will not be allowed to be shown within the exhibit.
13. Any numismatic material, known to be a legitimate copy or replica, must be labeled. Any material known to be forged, spurious or counterfeit will not be displayed unless the exhibit is titled and labeled as an educational exhibit of forgeries.
14. All cases must lie flat on the exhibit table, and no material of any kind will be allowed outside the display cases except signs not exceeding the length of one of the cases, and not higher than twelve (12) inches above the exhibit table.

15. Exhibit cases may be supplied by the exhibitor or will be loaned to exhibitors for use at the convention, providing the exhibitor has made known her/his requirements to the Exhibits Chair prior to the Exhibit Application cut-off date (see item 11). The O.N.A. strives to implement the same exhibit case limit as allowed by the R.C.N.A.: "No competitive exhibit will be allowed more than five cases except for paper money where the maximum will be six cases." The Exhibit Chair is authorized to limit the number of displays and the number of display cases used in a single display. This may be necessitated by an insufficient supply of cases available for loan or insufficient exhibit space. Serious exhibitors are urged to submit their Exhibit Application well before the application cut-off date since Exhibit Applications are processed in the order received.
16. Each exhibit case will be closed and locked by the Exhibit Chair or her/his assistant in the owner's presence. The keys will be kept by the Exhibitor until the removal of the exhibit, where cases are supplied by the convention.
17. No exhibit will be removed from the exhibit area prior to the close of the exhibit period which will be set by the Exhibit Chair. (**Consult the convention program of events for official exhibit setup and removal times.**) In cases of special circumstances, permission may be granted by the Exhibits Chair to take from the area before the closing time. Such permission must be in writing so that there is no miscommunication or misunderstanding.
18. Three judges will be appointed by the Head Judge to judge each category. They will have full and final authority to select all first, second and third awards. They will also have the authority to withhold any such award, in any category, where they feel the exhibits are deemed unworthy of an award.
19. After judging is completed, the judges will meet and briefly discuss their results. If their findings are not unanimous as to the order then the judges should discuss or re-evaluate the points awarded, if possible.
20. Judging sheet results may be made available by the Head Judge during the convention if requested by a display. The judges' decision shall be final and binding in all cases.
21. Adequate security protection will be provided for the exhibit room during the period of the convention commencing at the time the room is opened to the exhibitors to place their exhibits and continuing until the time that the Exhibits Chair has set by which the exhibits must be removed.
22. The Best of Show award is chosen from the first place awards given in categories A - E. This Best of Show award is officially presented at the O.N.A. convention banquet on Saturday evening of the convention.
23. The Peoples' Choice award is judged by the general public who view the exhibits. Ballots are provided to everyone entering the exhibit area. People can vote for the best exhibit of their choice and place the ballot in the designated box. The Peoples' Choice award is presented at 3:00 p.m. on Sunday afternoon of the convention.
24. Awards, in the form of an engraved O.N.A. Convention Medal and a coloured award ribbon will be presented to the first, second and third place winners in all categories, plus the Peoples' Choice award and Best of Show award winners.
